## Mental Health for All

A study published in the *International Journal of Educational Research* explores the effects of teacher burnout. Findings suggest burnout can negatively impact school climate, collective efficacy, and sometimes leads to additional mental health concerns, such as depression.

### What can staff do?

Teachers and staff can build communities of practice and utilize coping skills.

### What can school leaders do?

Principals can reinforce efficacy beliefs, ensure a supportive working environment, and increase good relationships between school members.

### What can policy-makers do?

State-level partners can improve field-preparation programs and build in prevention to reduce burnout in the change process.

## What constitutes a "welcoming school environment"?

A survey of parents and families in *Education and Urban Society* suggests:

1. Visible and accessible leadership
2. Questions/concerns addressed in a timely fashion
3. Positive emotional rapport
4. Greetings from office staff
5. Ongoing engagement in conversation
6. Encouraging participation in the classroom
7. Hosting/sponsoring events throughout the year
8. Taking action against bullying
9. Reducing language barriers
10. Resources available beyond what is required

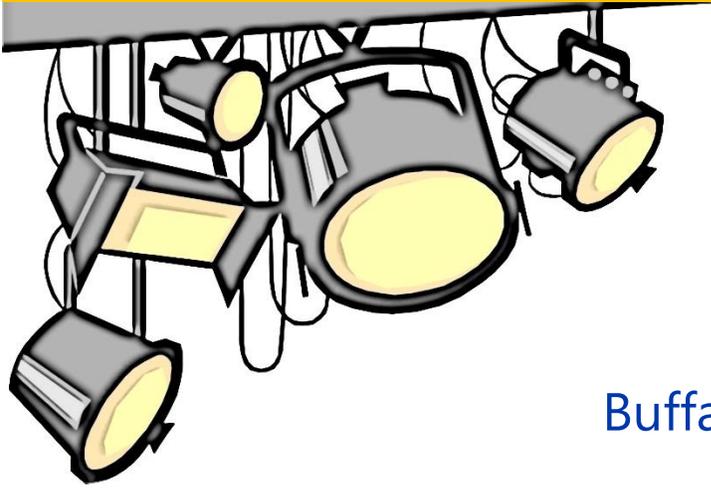

## Monthly Spotlight on Safe & Supportive Schools

### Buffalo Public Schools

This month's Spotlight highlights the work of **PS 197** and **PS 131**, who hit the ground running this school year with a clear vision of comprehensive and systematic support for students. Dedicated teams monitor student attendance, academic progress, behavior, and tiered interventions. Using data, they identify at-risk students and connect them with needed supports (e.g. tutoring, peer mentoring, anger management, and community-based services).

Monica Capozzi, a district coach, works closely with administration and staff as they expand their knowledge and use of evidence-based practices. Coaching is used effectively to support professional development, and build upon, scale up, and sustain what works.

Administration and staff in BPS schools understand that student leadership – “*voice and choice*” – is critical. They have invested in opportunities for students to mentor, gain social-emotional skills, collaborate with others, and share input for decision-making processes.

To address chronic absenteeism, schools use initiatives to motivate and incentivize students to arrive on time and attend regularly. Staff and student success is celebrated through awards ceremonies, school-wide events, and teacher appreciation.

At the district-level, efforts are sustained to address bullying through an Anti-Bullying Task Force.
